

The farmer felt the chill in the air.


"It is time to fetch the pumpkins," he thought.




He brought his trusty horse out of the barn. The horse seemed to know what was to come next. The horse neighed at the kind farmer and swished its tail.




The farmer picked up some hay with his pitch fork and fed his horse.

"Eat well," he said, "because we will be working hard tonight."




After a short while, the farmer hitched the old cart to his horse. He looked at his watch. It was the start of a long day.




The farmer closed the latch on the barn door. Off he went, with his horse and cart, to the pumpkin patch. Clip, clop. Clip, clop.




People came from far away and bought the pumpkins.


