Getting Ready - A Broad View of the Landscape Before You Begin



One-syllable words that have a silent "e" at the end, also follow the Two Vowel Rule, which we have already introduced. Although counting the vowels with silent "e" words is an easy way to determine a long vowel sound, we want to offer your reader another learning tool for reading words with silent "e", as they may also encounter the silent "e" concept elsewhere.

Rule: The letter "e" on the end of a word usually makes the first vowel long.

Listen to the song entitled 'e' on the End. It's a mysterious sounding song - just as the silent "e" is a mysterious letter, always sneaking up on the end of a word! Some reading programs teach the silent "e" concept in a slightly different way. We think that teaching the silent "e" as another form of the Two Vowel Rule is less confusing. The Two Vowel Rule applies to silent "e" words too! The vowels are separated by a consonant, but still, the second vowel is quiet - completely silent.

Turn to The Reading Place, page 83, and find the section containing words for this expedition. Read the words together from lists one and two and see what the silent "e" can do. Don't forget to point out that silent "e" words follow the Two Vowel Rule! Even though the vowels aren't next to each other, the second vowel is silent!

Taking a Closer Look - Sample Dialogue to Help Direct Your Course

Tour Guide: (After listening to the 'e' on the End song together) "We have another special way of applying the Two Vowel Rule, even when the vowels are not sitting next to each other. Sometimes the letter 'e' is so tired of hearing the other vowel sing, that it sleeps and sleeps and sleeps at the end of the word. It doesn't make one peep. The 'e' is silent, but it still makes the vowel have a long sound. I'll show you what I mean." (Turns to The Reading Place, page 83.)



Reader: "Okay!"

Tour Guide: "Look at the words in this column. (The Tour Guide points to the left column of words.) These

are all words you've already learned! Can you read them for me?"

Reader: (The child reads the left column of words.)

Tour Guide: "Super reading! Now, I'll show you the special power that a sleeping, silent 'e' has. Look at the

word 'can'. It has one vowel and the vowel is short. It says "can". If we add the silent 'e', the 'e' doesn't say one thing, but it makes the vowel long. 'Can' becomes 'cane'. 'Kit' becomes 'kite'. Short sounds become long. Let's read all of these words together and then we can listen to the song again. You are becoming such an expert reader. When we're finished, you can put sticker number

22 on your chart!

Tour Guide's Note: Throughout the Expeditions to Excellence reading system, continue to review mastered power readers and word lists together. Just a ten-minute review, per day, keeps reading skills and concepts sharp! Review time generally should be a separate time, and not the time spent mastering a new expedition.

What You'll Need to Pack for the Safari



You will need *The Reading Place* (pages 83-86), *'e' on the End* song (track 11) and a little bit of magic, to turn short vowel words into long vowel words with a silent "e"!

Results to Achieve During Your Expedition



Your reader will learn the concept of the silent "e", and he or she will determine how the sound of a vowel changes from short to long when a silent "e" is added to the end of a one-vowel word. Also, your reader will understand that silent "e" words follow the Two Vowel Rule...even though the two vowels are separated by a consonant.
