Getting Ready - A Broad View of the Landscape Before You Begin



Some consonant blends and digraphs have silent letters. In fact, one of the very first letter combinations we introduced was "wh", which, of course, has a silent "h". In this expedition, several letter combinations have silent letters. Specifically, these are "wr", "kn" and "gn". Some of the blends appear at the ends of words, such as "It", "Ik" and "mp". The combination "ph" is special because it is pronounced "fff". The "ph" blend can appear at the beginning and at the end of words. Follow the steps outlined below to teach these new sounds.

Step 1 Find the consonant blends and digraphs for this expedition ("thr", "ph", "wr", "kn", "gn", "lt", "lk", "mp") in Flash Card Set 14. One at a time, model the sound of each letter combinations for your child. The reader should repeat the sound after you. Continue to do this, until you feel that the reader is ready to "read" the sounds from the cards, without the benefit of hearing the sound modeled first.

Taking a Closer Look - Sample Dialogue to Help Direct Your Course

Tour Guide: "Do you remember when we learned about silent 'e'?"

Reader: "Yes."

Tour Guide: "What does silent 'e' do? Do you remember what the song says?"

Reader: "It sleeps at the end of a two-vowel word."

Tour Guide: "That's right! And do you remember what the Two Vowel Rule says about the

second vowel?"

Reader: "It says it doesn't say anything. It listens to the first vowel sing."


Tour Guide: "You are so smart! You remember the words of the songs, don't you?"

Reader: "Um-hmmm."


Tour Guide: "Sometimes, consonants can be just like silent vowels. The consonant blends in this next
