Getting Ready - A Broad View of the Landscape Before You Begin



Turn to page 155 in *The Reading Place* and follow the steps outlined below.

- Step 1 After practicing the sounds of the irregular vowel combinations from the previous expedition, you will teach your reader words containing the same combinations and sounds. As you have done in the past, help your safari mate to read the words on each word list. Help him or her to blend the letters together. As each list is mastered, move to the next one, until all of the lists are mastered, including the sight words. By following the Jungle Journal, you will be able to steer your reader toward each new accomplishment in the correct sequence.
- At the conclusion of this expedition, you will find a new power reader. It is written using only mastered words. If your reader seems to have an unusual level of difficulty with any power reader, review those words that seem to pose consistent problems, and then return to the power reader once again. Always be sure to select a proper environment and time for reading together. Such an environment is one in which the child can properly attend to the task at hand, without distractions. Praise and encouragement should accompany the reading effort at all times. If possible, suggest that the reader entertain a younger sibling or grandparent with the books in this reading system. This will help to bolster self-confidence and will foster a sense of accomplishment.
- Step 3 Share the section at the back of each story entitled Conversation Station. These discussion points are designed to impart information to your reader, check for reading comprehension and provide a platform for important dialogue. The sequencing exercise is another way to test your reader's ability to recall the events in the story.
- Step 4 Corresponding Funsheets and games are provided with many expeditions to measure and strengthen understanding. You should find a time when you are available and present to help, if necessary, because most Funsheets may require someone to read directions or assist the reader in some other way. The Funsheets in many lessons also require your child's understanding of basic shape recognition. The child may, for example, wish to draw a square, circle, triangle, etc., around the correct answer.

Power Reader 17 introduces a young artist named Paul who loves to draw and paint. Lots of safari mates have talents in common with Paul. A knowledge of color and shapes is helpful when drawing a painting. In this expedition, two new songs are introduced - The Shape Waltz and The Color Song. You'll find the lyrics to both songs on the next page.
