Getting Ready - A Broad View of the Landscape Before You Begin

Listen to the song again entitled Soft "c" and "g" that is found on track 23.

Rule: When "g" is followed by an "e", "i", or "y", it usually will have a "soft" sound, like "j".

The objective of this expedition is to identify that the consonant letter "q" has a "hard" sound and a soft sound. The soft sound, which sounds like the sound of the letter "j", is heard when the "g" is followed by an "e", an "i" or a "y". This holds true when the "g" is at the beginning of a

word or somewhere in the middle of a word such as in the word "huge".

Turn to page 209 in The Reading Place. Read the cover page poem and then read the words listed with the soft "g" sound aloud. Kindly ask your reader to read them independently, after you have modeled the words, list by list. Read only the first two lists for this expedition - only words with soft "g" sound.

*Please note the lesson on page 211 of The Reading Place about the few words in the English language that use "y" as a vowel.

Taking a Closer Look - Sample Dialogue to Help Direct Your Course

Tour Guide: "The same rule that we learned for the letter 'c', works with the letter 'g',

as well. When 'g' is followed by an 'e', 'i' or 'y' in a word, it makes its 'soft' sound. It sounds like the 'j' sound. (Tour Guide turns to The Reading Place, page 210.) First, I'm going to read these words aloud to you, and after that, without looking at the words, tell me what sound they have." (Tour Guide

reads the words.)

Reader: "They have a sound like 'j'." (a soft sound)

Tour Guide: "Right! Now, let's read them together and you can learn how to read the 'soft' sound of 'g'

Results to Achieve During Your Expedition





G---Whiz!

G-Whiz...here's how to play!

(for 2-4 players)

The goal of this game is to move both game pieces around the board, reading the words along the way, finally reaching "Lean Gene" the thin, yellow man in the center of the board. The other yellow men on the board are Gene's friends. If a player lands on one of Gene's friends, he or she must shout "G-Whiz!", and must follow the directions stated on that space on the board.

Each player should select two game pieces that are distinct from the other player's pieces, and place them on "Start". You will need a set of dice for this game. If you do not have dice, you can use the set of "dice cards" instead. Just cut them out, shuffle them and place them face-down to select from a pile. For example, one player might select

To bring a game piece onto the board, a player must roll a 1 or a 2 on the die. If a player does not roll a 1 or a 2, he or she forfeits that turn. A player may bring a second piece on to the board at any time during the game, but must always come out onto the board on a 1 or a 2. If a player lands on a space occupied by another player, it is okay. Two or more players can occupy the same space on any given turn.

As players land on spaces around the game board, they must read the word on which they land out loud. Players must also read the words out loud that the yellow men tell them to read. The first player to get both game pieces to the center of the board wins. A player does not need to reach the center on an exact roll of the die.
