

Getting Ready - A Broad View of the Landscape Before You Begin



This last group of prefixes is the largest group. There are ten prefixes in all. There is little doubt that your safari mate will have no problem learning to say these prefixes. Although we think it is important to introduce the prefixes, the words in which they are used may be a bit advanced for your child's vocabulary. We recommend that you introduce your child to these sounds, but don't be overly concerned about whether your reader fully understands the meaning of all of the words that will be introduced in the following expedition.

Taking a Closer Look - Sample Dialogue to Help Direct Your Course

Tour Guide: "We have one more group of prefixes to learn. They're all fairly easy and I just know that you're going to earn that next sticker guickly. This is sticker number 66!"

Reader: "Hooray!"

- Tour Guide: "There are some pretty cool prefixes in this group. Did you know that the word "super" could be a prefix?"
 - Reader: "No!"
- Tour Guide: "Well, it's a prefix, all right. How else could we make words such as superman, or superstar? And everyone knows, you're a reading superstar, so it's a very important word with a prefix we need to learn to recognize! Let's look at our last group of prefix flash cards. I'll read them first, then you can try them on your own."

Results to Achieve During Your Expedition




The reader will learn to read and say the following prefixes from flash cards: "super", "post", "per", "em", "non", "ab", "trans", "im", "anti", "inter".



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The prefix "non" means "not". When we put this prefix in front of another word, it makes that word mean almost the opposite of what it is. Combine the prefix "non" on the left to the word on the right in each diamond below. See if you can say the new word that you make.
