Getting Ready - A Broad View of the Landscape Before You Begin



Have you looked at all of the Navigation Tips at the back of *The Reading Place*? One of them, Navigation Tip K, is a list of suggested reading materials, outlined by age group. Your safari mate has now mastered almost all of the tools he or she needs to read many of the books listed in the supplement. Your neighborhood bookstore or your local library will have most of the books that are listed. Most libraries also have a list of recommended reading at the reference desk. You may want to ask for it the next time you visit a library near you.

As discussed in the previous expedition, the prefixes introduced in this last grouping are important for your safari mate to learn, yet many of the words in which the prefixes are used may be beyond your child's comprehension. Look at the words for this expedition in *The Reading Place* on page 237. Read through them, as you have done before, but do not worry about whether your reader fully understands the meanings of all of the words listed.

It may continue to be helpful if you use an index card to cover the prefix as your reader reads the second part of the word. Uncover the prefix and ask him or her to read the entire word.

There is a fun board game in this folder to play at the conclusion of the items listed in the Jungle Journal. It's called "Prefixes on the Green". If you like golf, you'll like this game, too!

Taking a Closer Look - Sample Dialogue to Help Direct Your Course

Tour Guide: "Here are some of the words that contain the prefixes you just learned. We'll learn them one list at a time."

Reader: "Okay."

Tour Guide: "First, I'll cover the prefix with this card. You can read the end of the word. Then, I'll uncover the prefix and you can put the two parts of the word together."

Reader: "That's simple!"

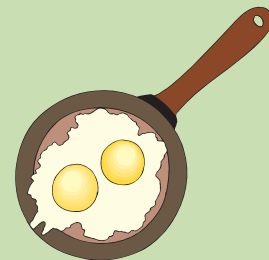

Prefixes on the Green

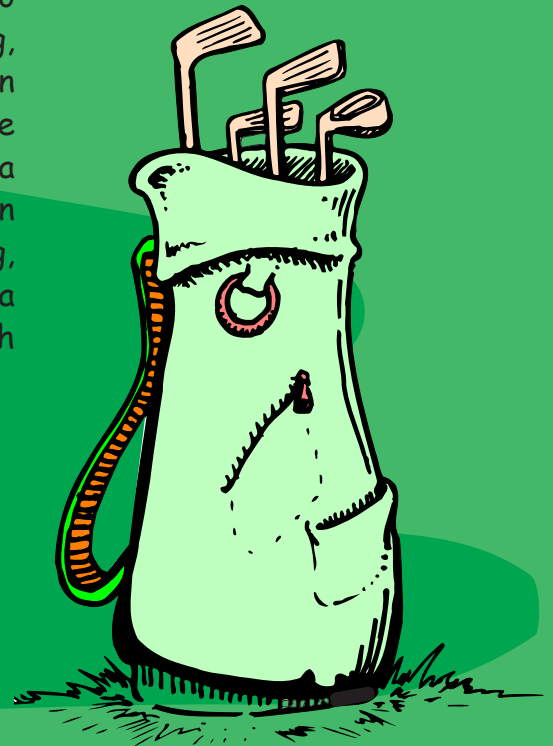
(for 2-4 players)

Do you like to play miniature golf? If so, then this is the game for you! You don't need to have a great swing, but your reading skills do need to be up to "par" - at least where reading words with prefixes is concerned.



To play the game, you will need one of the dice, and one game piece for each player. If you do not have dice, you can use the set of "dice cards" instead. Just cut them out, shuffle them and place them face-down to select from a pile. After rolling the die to see who goes first, the players put their game pieces on the golf tee in the lower right hand corner of the board.

The first player rolls the die and moves the amount of spaces shown. If the player lands on one of the pictures of the golfers, he or she must do what the instructions say to do. If, instead, the player lands on one of the colored golf balls, he or she must find the word list corresponding to that color ball on the adjoining page and read the list of words containing random, mastered prefixes aloud. If the player lands on one of the spaces featuring the flag and the hole, that is a "free" space - no reading is necessary. The players take turns rolling the die, reading the word lists aloud and moving around the game board until one player reaches the last flag and wins the game. To reach the last flag, a player must roll an exact number on the die. For example, if a player is two spaces in front of the last flag, he or she must roll a "2" in order to reach the end.

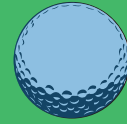

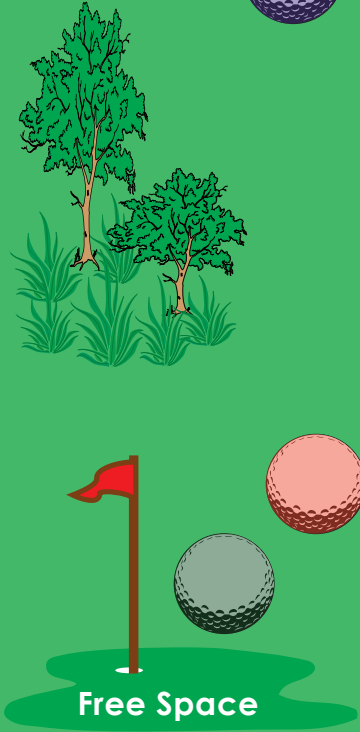
