

#### Getting Ready - A Broad View of the Landscape Before You Begin



Your reader has mastered saying the suffixes and endings in Group 1. Find the poem and the words for this expedition in *The Reading Place* page 243. Teach words with suffixes and endings one list at a time, mastering every word on the list before moving on to the next one.

It may help to use an index card or paper to cover the suffix from the remainder of the word. Ask the reader to read the uncovered part first. Reveal the suffix or ending, and him or her to read the entire word. Gradually, work through all of the lists until all of the items for this

expedition have been completed.

By this point, you have undoubtedly noticed that the words on the lists have begun to get longer and more complicated. Don't stress! Each of the words appearing on the lists follow the rules you and your reader have learned throughout this reading system. Each word, broken into its syllables, should look like a familiar smaller word, and will follow familiar rules of phonics. The most important things to keep in mind are to take it slowly, to learn one list at a time and to continue to review and ask for the lists to be read in random order.

#### Taking a Closer Look - Sample Dialogue to Help Direct Your Course

Tour Guide: "Do you recognize the sounds in the boxes at the top of these word lists?"

Reader: "They're suffixes!"

Tour Guide: "Right! All we need to do is say these sounds at the ends of words that we

can already read. Do you think you can do that?"

Reader: "No problem!"

Tour Guide: "We'll take each list very slowly, and we won't try to do too many lists at one sitting. Which of

these lists would you like to try first? You can make the choice today."





Your Tour Guide will read the facts about these famous individuals. Look for the underlined word endings. You can read the words highlighted in red underneath each picture.




He was the sixteenth president of the United States.

A Famous President




This fam<u>ous</u> scientist discovered an abund<u>ance</u> of farming methods and uses for peanuts.




Why will you be famous when you grow up?


This very smart man invented the telephone. He was inventive.






This bold woman spoke out about the rights of all women, especially a woman's right to vote.
