

## Getting Ready - A Broad View of the Landscape Before You Begin



Congratulations! You have reached the final expedition in the pursuit of reading excellence! You and your reader should be very proud of your accomplishment. Your dedication, commitment and perseverance have provided your reader some of the tools that are integral to his or her educational, social and professional well-being for life.

Praise your reader enthusiastically, as you commence this last expedition. Undoubtedly, he or she will be excited, as you endeavor to learn these last items. Accompany the lesson with lots

of ceremony and fanfare. Suggest that your reader place stars or check marks on the Jungle Journal as he or she masters each item, as a sort of "countdown" to graduation. Anything you can do to reward and honor your reader's efforts is a good thing to do.

You will want to approach teaching the contractions in this expedition in the same manner as you taught the first group of contractions. Flash Card Set 30 has the second set of 16 contractions. Pair the contractions together, and lay them out (in two groups) on a table or on the floor in front of your reader as follows:

had not	hadn't	has not	hasn't
how is	how's	he will	he'll
l will	[']]	here is	here's
it will	it'll	should not	shouldn't
she will	she'll	they are	they're
there is	there's	they have	they've
would not	wouldn't	where is	where's
you are	you're	will not	won't

Focus on only eight sets of contractions at a time (one of the two groups above). Model reading each set of contractions for your safari mate in the same manner as the examples outlined. First, say the original two words. Next, point out *how* the contraction is made – a space and some letters are eliminated. Last, read the word in its contracted form.

After the lesson on *how* each contraction is formed, simply read each set of contractions for your safari mate. For right now, this is the most important part of the expedition for your student. *He or she just needs to remember how to read the contracted form of the words*. It's great if he or she also understands the original words and meanings of each contracted form.

It will then be time to:

- 1. Place the final sticker on the Safari Success Trail poster.
- 2. Give your reader a special treat or gift he or she has earned for completing the Expeditions to Excellence Reading System.
- 3. Fill out the diploma included in this program with the reader's name, and the date of completion.
- 4. Share the news of the accomplishment with anyone who will listen! You should both be proud!
- 5. Continue the reading journey. Keep adding accomplishments to the reading journal in *The Reading Place*. It's a journey that can be enjoyed for a lifetime!

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Taking a Closer Look - Sample Dialogue to Help Direct Your Course

*Tour Guide:* "(Child's name), this is our last expedition! You will graduate today! Are you excited?"

Reader: "Yes - hooray!"

*Tour Guide:* "We have one more group of contractions to master. When you're all done, do you know what will happen?"



- *Reader:* "I will finish my sticker chart and make it to the end!"
- *Tour Guide:* "Yes, but that's not all! You get a special treat and a diploma, too! We'll hang up your diploma in a very special place for everyone to see. We are all so very, very proud of you!"

Here are some discussion and comprehension prompts to use when reading with your safari mate.

Before reading the book, ask him or her to think about these sentences.

"I predict that this story is about..."

or

"When I look at the cover, it makes me think of..."





After reading the book, consider these sentences.

"I think (someone else's name) would like this book because..."

or

"The thing that most surprised me about this story was..."

You may wish to prompt your reader to complete these lines:

- "I learned that..."
  - or
- "I can re-tell this story in my own words.


Results to Achieve During Your Expedition

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## Play Contraction Attraction!

(for 2 players)

In this fun and fast-paced game, you and your safari mate will be on the lookout for contractions. Whoever can "collect" the most contractions will win the game.

Here's how to play ...

- Player One should be the student. Player Two should be the Tour Guide. The words
  on the board face Player One. You will need Flash Card Sets 29 and 30. Combine
  the two sets of flash cards, but remove all of the words in their contracted form.
  The only cards remaining should be those with two words on them. Shuffle the
  cards and place them face down in the middle of the game board.
- 2. Each player will need fifteen (15) tiny game pieces. Player One should have different game pieces than Player Two. You may want to use pennies, buttons, cut up construction paper of different colors or paper clips. The players should put their pieces on their area on the game board labeled "Player One" or "Player Two".
- 3. Player One goes first. He or she picks the top card from the pile and reads the two words appearing on it. He or she then searches the spaces on the board for the contracted form of the two words. If it appears on the board, the player puts one of his or her game pieces on the space. Player One "owns" that contraction. (There are more cards than there are spaces on the board. Therefore, the player may pick a card for which there is no contraction to match. If this happens, the player does not get to place a game piece on the board.) The used card is placed face-up in a discard pile. It then becomes time for Player Two to pick a card. Player Two reads the two words and searches for the matching contraction on the board.
- 4. The game continues until all of the spaces on the board are covered with a game piece. The player with the most game pieces on the board wins the game!
